We're always thinking about what's next for every age group to enrich, excite, and provide the coolest new adventures, and the best, most beautiful and comfortable everything! New for Summer 2015: a state-of-the-art septic system (so exciting!), new roofs on our Zaban Chapel and many cabins, new docks on our CBM beachfront, renovated tennis "shack," 6 totally re-surfaced tennis courts, improvements to bathrooms and staff living spaces, and new features in the dance center, film studio, water ski docks, new ropes courses, and more!

We are humbled, proud, and excited to have registered nearly **1300 boys and girls** (as of March 10th) for this summer, a rather amazing pace in our Camp history. Generation of Change: How Leaders in their Twenties and Thirties are Reshaping American Jewish Life

An extensive 2010 study done by Jack Wertheimer, Professor of American Jewish History at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, examines the identities and attitudes of today's young cohort of Jewish leaders and explains the effect of their childhood involvement in Jewish activities on their adult leadership behavior.

A whopping 71 percent of young leaders surveyed attended Jewish summer camp, as the study explains: "The rates of participation by these leaders in Jewish summer camps, youth movements, Hillel, and other forms of Jewish education are extraordinarily high, suggesting that many of the young leaders were groomed rather than having bloomed on their own."

Clearly, the potential of raising leaders at Jewish camp is enormous, and we are proud to be a part of that effort!

I was not a great camper, and yet I loved going to Camp Barney Medintz.

Go back... way, way back: 1967, 1968, 1969, 5th, 6th, 7th grade I think. I remember waking up to a mix of music from Woodstock and Diana Ross and the Supremes blaring through the camp. I hated sleep overs in the woods. I loved dances on the tennis courts. I hated getting my hair wet and trying over and over again to get my Junior Life Saver Certificate. I never succeeded in saving anyone. I couldn't get enough of water skiing, canoeing, horseback riding, and anything that involved a stage and a microphone.

Did my 40-year career as an Emmy award-winning tv investigative reporter have its beginnings at Camp Barney? Probably.

Here's my big claim to fame at camp. There was a contest to name a new building at camp one year. The prize was a tape recorder with a microphone. I wanted that tape recorder.


My entry name was "Barney's Ark." Yep, that was me. I named the Ark and won the tape recorder. And the rest is history.

I remember being hit with shaving cream in cold showers, meeting boys on the archery range, beautiful shabbat services, a boys bunk called the Wombats. I remember Jeff Lefkoff and Mark Balser and my best friend Jan Landau sharing a bunk bed every year, and Robert Arogeti, who had to be the funniest person at camp. I remember color wars and sitting by a big camp fire and laughing so hard I couldn't catch my breath.

Today I'm married, 32 years to Phil Houser, the man who taught me most about love and tv news. Our daughter Alexa is 27 and of course, I sent her to a Jewish overnight camp outside of Philadelphia where we live.

I survived breast cancer, kidney cancer and having my colon removed for ulcerative colitis. I've lived a public life on many stages.

In 2010, I did something new every day for a year and blogged about it. It became the basis of a book published by Penguin in hardback and paperback in 2014. It's called "I Dare Me." What did I do? The Polar Bear Plunge, zip lining over a crocodile infested lake, I ate a scorpion, I went back to school.



Today, I dare the next generation of communicators at Temple University where I help launch them into their careers.

Perhaps my personal I Dare Me adventures have been a throwback... a nod to that child of the '60s who experienced dares and Firsts every day at Barney; a time when every day was an adventure.

I can hear it now... "ain't no mountain high enough, ain't no valley low enough..." I'm grateful my memories of Barney are vivid and strong and I proudly carry them with me...
"ain't no river wide enough to keep me away from you, babe."
